McGill University

A Montreal Landmark



Founded in 1821 thanks to a donation by a fur merchant named James McGill, McGill University is the oldest university among the four universities in the city of Montreal. The main campus of the university is covered in green landscape at the foot of Mount Royal.

On the north of McGill College Avenue, we will find two huge building which are for Chemistry and Physics. The chemistry building was founded in 1896 and the physics building in 1893. A little way down the road we will find the MacDonald Engineering Building which is a great example of the Neo Baroque English style.

Not far away from there, we can find McGill's oldest building, the Arts Building, which is founded in 1839. McGill also have a theater named Moyse Hall. A beautifully built all the way from 1926. By visiting the campus, we can also see the Redpath Library.

Old gargoyle statues and columns can also be found in this place which is an example of one the most sophisticated Neo Roman style of Canada. To shed light to the most popular university of Canada, I interviewed a McGill student who has been attending the school for three years now. She is studying to become an elementary school teacher and her name is Anna Saludo.







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What made you go to McGill in the first place?

"I had heard that the school has a very good reputation, it is located close to my home and the school had my program of choice (K/Elementary Education French Immersion). In fact, when I was choosing schools for my University application, the distance from my house was a big factor as I would have to use public transportation. Now, it only takes me about 45 minutes to an hour to get to class (including doing the climb up the hill on Peel street)."

Is McGill University worth the visit for student hopefuls?

"Yes, definitely! Not only does the school have a wide range of programs to choose from, it also has beautiful buildings. And with the renovations on McTavish Street, there is now a nice pathway to walk up the hill, where the view of the scenery is quite extraordinary."

These past years have definitely help mold my personal and professional development."

Describe McGill's buildings and why are they worth the visit?

"McGill University has beautiful architecture and landscaping. While most of the buildings are old, it has history and is still stylish nowadays. All of the buildings are definitely worth the visit as you can learn about each by the plaques around campuses and from the tour guides as well. As a matter of fact, these ancient buildings are the foundation of the school and shows the world the school's culture and history."

Is the school gift shop worth the visit for people that wants to buy McGill merchandise?

"Yes, for sure!" The McGill bookstore features many various items of clothing such as hoodies, jogging pants, t-shirts, varsity jacket and more. All of them also come in various sizes and colors. 






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Montreal Resident on "Why Grocery Stores in Montreal Have the Best Variety of Products for Everyone"

Raffi: "It's delightful, my mom and I always enjoyed doing grocery shopping together when I was younger. We always found a variety of food products that were from Lebanon and today is even better for me when I do grocery shopping with my wife and two sons."

Raffi: "It's my pleasure. It's always a pleasure to talk about this wonderful city."


Raffi explained a lot on why Montreal is the best city to do grocery shopping for either the person just moving here, tourists, or for someone already living in this great city.







One of Montreal's most iconic landmarks is Saint Joseph Oratory. Located on Queen-Mary Road near Côte-des-Neiges, you can see the distinctive dome of the oratory from far away if you are around the city. The oratory being located in a small mountain, it is very accessible for people. There is a bus stop near it for the people that are coming by public transportation. If you do not feel like taking the lengthy stairs up to the oratory, you can take the shuttle that takes you all the way to the top. Saint-Joseph Oratory is also very accessible even for disabled people and there are wheel chair ramps everywhere for people that may need it. The church is always open for people visit but the basilica on top is only open on certain hours. Three different gift shops are also available for its visitors. There is the main gift shop which is open Monday to Saturday 8:30a.m. to 6p.m. and 8a.m. to 7p.m. on Sundays. The mezzanine gift shop

is open every day from 9a.m. to 5p.m. And the Oratory gift shop is open every day 10am to 4:30p.m. All of these gift shops have unique items to offer from rosaries, small religious models, post cards to key chains that can only be found in these gift shops. If you get hungry while visiting this huge place of worship and tourist site, there is a coffee shop available. The coffee shop offers different kinds of foods, from breakfast, sandwich, paninis, salads, snacks and even desserts for your sweet tooth. Daily specials are also available. Different drinks such as soda, juice, water, tea and of course coffee are also available at the coffee shop.

We got a little insight from one of our reader's who has had the experience with both forms of transportation. He is constantly travelling to downtown, whether it be for school or leisure. Here is a quick look into our conversation;

Have you had the experience of taking a car or public transit downtown?

"Both actually. It really differs for me, if I get the chance though I prefer to take my car."

What dictates the use of a car or public transit for you?

"The time. Usually when I am heading to school I will always use public transit. I'm usually heading to class in the early morning rush and taking a car takes way too long. The only times I really take the chance to use my car is when I'm going out with friends. We make sure to set our plans for the odd times in the day because there isn't much traffic and we can get to our destination quickly. "

Which form of transport is most convenient for you?

"As a student I would definitely say public transport. It does take a lot of time out of the day and you always have to leave early, but it's so much easier to get to class on time. It also takes the stress of finding parking out of my day. Although outside of being a student, taking a car is less of a hassle all together and definitely less expensive."

Heading downtown is not the only thing that you need to worry about. Getting around in the area is also something of concern for people visiting. This factor has a big dependence on what type of year you are visiting in. Travelling around the downtown area in the colder




months can be rough. Walking is definitely a choice but you will have to bundle up really well to withstand the freezing temperatures.

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There are places all over downtown with these bike stations where you can easily take out a bike and ride around the area. Doing this makes you feel so carefree. Taking a car can also be useful, but if you want the full experience, we would suggest walking or biking. It is incredible being outside in Montreal's warmer weather, you get a completely different feeling when you are in contact with the space surrounding you.

Being in the open also allows visitors an inside look on how the locals interact with their amazing city. We got in contact with a downtown frequenter who goes around downtown throughout the year. Here's what she had to say about it:

How often do you make a trip downtown?

"I'm in the downtown area on an almost daily basis. I work in the area so I have to be there for my shifts and instead of heading straight home or having my lunch break in the office, I enjoy looking around. It's a good way to clear my head and it's quite relaxing."

When you get a break how do you get around?

"Most of the time I just walk around, it's more convenient and you can easily get through the narrow streets. Walking becomes a little more annoying when it's cold though. I always have to make sure I'm well prepared and wearing my warmest clothes. Even then though it can be really pretty to walk around in the snow with snowflakes falling around you. In the summer I also use the bixi bikes the city provides. There is a station close to my work and when I really just want some fresh air taking the bike is my favourite option."

Would you recommend walking/biking to people visiting?

"Yes absolutely! I find it to be a really amazing and grounding experience. The time I spend walking and biking around the area are some of my most cherished memories. It's also really fun to go around with friends. The whole day feels so free and happy, like there's nothing that could put a damper on my mood. I always prefer being outside to see the beauty of downtown than being in a car, even in the cold winter's we get."

Overall, there are so many ways to get around downtown. No matter what you choose though, you will not regret your decision. The beauty of this city makes up for any form of transportation you use to get to the area and travel through it.



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

takes reservations, so you won't have any waiting to do if you plan on visiting during a peak time!


Nearby St-Denis Street there are also has many other themed places, including animal themed cafes such as Le Doggy Café, and Café Chat L'Heureux; where you can play with

Exploring Chinatown

Montreal is a large and historic city of Canada, abundant in diversity. There are so many places to visit and explore in Montreal, and which many reflect on the city of Montreal's rich history. Chinatown is one of the many interesting places to visit, for both locals and visitors. Montreal's Chinatown is located in the heart of downtown, offf De la Gauchetière Street. It is a short walk from Place D'armes, the metro station located in the Palais des Congrès; a building where many conventions are held throughout the year. The neighborhood of Chinatown contains many Asian restaurants, food markets, and convenience stores. It is also where many of Montreal's East Asian community centres are located, such as the Montreal Chinese Hospital and the Montreal Chinese Community and Cultural Center. The neighborhood became officially known as 'Chinatown' back in 1902, which then had consisted of several blocks in the center of De La Gauchetière Street, between Chenneville Street and Clark Street. Presently, Chinatown's sector is slated as a tourist area, by Montreal's

Nowadays, Chinatown is a hotspot for locals and tourists alike, due to the unique shops, and delicious foods to try.

The shops found within the neighborhood offer unique products imported from countries of Asia that are not easy to find elsewhere in the city. These stores sell all kinds of products ranging from clothes, cosmetics, snacks and home goods, and all very affordable in pricing. You can also find many restaurants serving foods such as Cantonese seafood, dim sum restaurants, bubble tea, barbecue, Vietnamese Pho and bakeries.

Vietnamese Pho is one of the many popular foods to eat in Chinatown. There are several restaurants that serve it scattered throughout Chinatown. As soon as you are seated, you are given a hot complimentary pot of Jasmine tea, which goes very well with any of the food you may try. The food itself is a delicious hot bowl of soup, made with rice noodles, meat, and veggies; with several choices for different cuts and types of meat. You are also typically given a plate of mint, bean sprouts and lime, so that you may garnish your bowl to

your taste! There are also several appetizers and drinks you can try, including beers and imperial rolls. Not only is the food delicious, but it is very budget-friendly. One "small" bowl (which is generously sized) will cost less than ten dollars! A bowl of Vietnamese Pho is great for any time of year, but it is especially nice in the winter and spring time when Montreal's weather is at its coldest. Any visitor of Chinatown should definitely stop by a Pho restaurant to try some amazing Vietnamese cuisine.

Another great food that you can find in Chinatown is the bubble tea, a tea-based drink invented in Tainan in the 1980s, which over the years has grown in popularity all over the world. Bubble tea is a refreshing and frothy drink made with iced tea, flavorings (usually fruit flavors), sweetened milk and pearls made from tapioca. Some bubble tea shops are very customizable, where you can pick your base, flavors, and toppings to your taste. Either way, there are so many varieties

of flavors of bubble tea, ranging from sweet and fruity, to more tea-like flavors such as Matcha. Bubble tea is something that can fit into any budget, as a regular

sized bubble tea will cost less than five dollars, and it can be a both a drink and desert in one due to its filling and sweet qualities. Q: Why are you visiting Chinatown today?


A: "I came here today just to eat, really. I went to the dumpling restaurant on this block. The food is always so good."

Over 25,000 cyclists took over Montreal's streets and neighbourhoods for the Go Bike Montreal Festival (May 27 – June 3), and it was a thrill to be one of them.

As a weekend leisure biker, whose kids speed by me within minutes of a family ride, I was apprehensive about doing a cycling tour, imagining hard-core-calves-of-steel bikers and myself huffing and puffing way behind. I needn't have worried. It turned out the festival had everything to do with having fun on two wheels and was more of a celebration than a race.

History of the Montréal Bike Fest

Kickstarting the festival season, the Féria du vélo de Montréal (Montréal Bike Fest) derives its name from the Feria del Toro (Running of the Bulls) held in Spain and Southern France, a popular festival that fills the streets with an atmosphere of music and sun. Launched in 1999, the Montréal Bike Fest annually heralds the arrival of summer, while thousands of cyclists happily invade the city streets.

The Montréal Bike Fest comprises four main events:

The Tour de l'Île de Montréal was first held in 1985. This famous bike ride has played a major role in the growth of cycling throughout Québec, in addition to positioning Montréal favourably on the international

bec, in addition to positioning Montréal favourably on the intern

scene as a North American biking capital — according to several articles over the past few years in prestigious publications like the National Geographic Travel Guide and Time Magazine.

The year 1999 marked the launch of the nocturnal version of the Tour de l'Île de Montréal: the luminous Un Tour la Nuit. At the time, the event could not logistically accommodate more than 3,000 participants. This number rose to 6,000 in 2004 and 17,000 in 2012. And the trend followed by many participants to create a personalized look — decorated helmet, clothing, lighting and bike — makes this event more in keeping than ever with Montréal's traditional night life and fun.

First known under the name Jour V (2000-2002), Operation Bike-to-Work began extending its activities year-round in 2003. Since then, it has had a significant impact on individuals and companies in terms of choosing the bicycle as a daily mode of transportation that is healthy, ecological and economical.

Inaugurated in 2002, the Metropolitan Challenge has attracted a growing number of avid bikers — they numbered 4,000 in 2012 — keen to pedal extra kilometres — from 75 to 150 km — and enjoy the region's diverse panoramic landscapes.

Whether you want to cheer with the biggest bands on earth, watch the world's greatest tennis players, or laugh it up at the best comedy festival anywhere, bring your shades and get ready for a party.



Montreal festivals in May

The month of May technically falls in the category of spring, but for Montreal it's a sense-stimulating, digitally-driven summer teaser.

ELEKTRA is a digital arts festival showcasing new creations in electronic music, video, cinema, performance, design, gaming, and interactive installation, and a definite must-see.

Dates: Jun. 11 - Jun. 16, 2019

Chromatic offers eight days of creative arts, ranging from visual to digital and performance to interactive, high atop the iconic Mount Roval.

Dates: May. 10 - May 17, 2019

Don't miss the overlapping multi-sensory MUTEK festival, an ode to the artists and innovators in electronic music, digital creativity, technology, and live performance.

Dates: May 2, 2019 - May 5, 2019

Then, later in the month, the Festival TransAmériques lights up the city with compelling new works in contemporary dance and theater.



Montreal festivals in June

Want to brush up your French? In mid-June, Les FrancoFolies de Montreal celebrates French-language music from around the globe, with 180 free outdoor performances of pop, rock, blues, jazz, and world music.

Not long after, we paint the town red – and plenty of other colours too during MURAL Festival, devoted to showcasing the sublime world of urban art and graffiti in Montreal's happening Plateau neighbourhood. Dates: June 06, 2019 – June 16, 2019

Proving it's a cosmopolitan city with A-list pull, every June Montreal welcomes the Formula 1 Grand Prix du Canada, the only race of its kind in North America. Superfast cars and star-studded parties power this glitzy weekend.

Date: June 9, 2019

Swinging in at the end of June is the incomparable Montreal International Jazz Festival. Officially crowned the biggest jazz fest in the



world, this granddaddy of festivals is all about musicians playing and people swaying in the Quartier des Spectacles downtown.

Dates: Jun. 27, 2019 - Jul. 6, 2019

Montreal festivals in July

The sun-kissed vibes of Africa arrive in Montreal in early July, with the Festival International Nuits d'Afrique. The event welcomes traditional and ground-breaking musicians from Africa, the Caribbean, and Latin America as well as local talent.

If you get your kicks from comedy, Montreal's legendary Just for Laughs has been a springboard for some of the craft's biggest names who, come July, fill comedy venues, downtown theatres, and nightclubs.

Dates: July 10 - July 29 2019

July also marks the start of the colour-popping pyrotechnics of the International des feux Loto-Québec, a fireworks competition that promises sky-high dazzle.

Dates: Jun. 29 -Jul. 27, 2019

Are you a culture-vulture? The world-famous Fantasia film festival wows with rarities and much-anticipated features in fantasy, horror, science fiction, and more, from mid-July to early August.

Dates: Jul. 11 - Aug. 1, 2019

Zoofest is relatively new to Montreal's festival scene, but it has proven to be a hit with its line-up of stand-up, sketch comedy, burlesque, and general zaniness.

Dates: Jul. 12 - Jul. 13, 2019

Circus artists from the Americas and Europe flaunt their creativity and flexibility during Montréal Complètement Cirque.

Dates: Jul. 04 - 11, 2019

Montreal Festivals in August

IleSoniq, which kicks off in mid-August, brings a sizzling line-up of new electronic dance and urban music to the city.

Date: August 9, 2019

And proving that every weekend is another opportunity to party, Piknic Électronik satisfies electronic music cravings with top DJs and producers every Sunday at Parc Jean-Drapeau all throughout the summer.

The LGBT community shares their spirit during Montreal's muchloved mid-August Pride events, including the exuberant and colourful Pride Parade, which caps off a week of community and cultural events.

Around the same time, fans of symphony music are given a veritable tympanic treat when the Montreal Symphony Orchestra showcases its Classical Spree.

If you're into electronic, hip hop or indie music, Montreal's got you covered with MEG Montreal, which runs from late July to early August.

The epic Osheaga Music and Arts Festival, where big names and emerging artists in indie pop, rock, hip hop, and electronic music share the stage for three days straight on scenic Île Sainte-Hélène. In mid-July, Montreal's Uniprix Stadium welcomes the female superstars of tennis for the Rogers Cup tournament, where blistering serves, searing backhands, and killer smashes leave sports fans blown away and breathless.

Finally, the Montreal First Peoples Festival takes us back to the roots of Aboriginal cultures in Montreal, Canada and around the world, with concerts, film screenings, talks, and more from July through to August.
