
The JAC Report

For those straight out of high school, your first semester can be a little intimidating. No fret, this guide will show you the way through the overwhelming mess of registration and administration that is the CEGEP experience.



Applying to a program:

To apply for any program, its very simple. Visit the service regional d'administration du Montreal (SRAM) and follow the steps.

To pick a program simply type in the program number is the corresponding field. The program number can easily be found via the search tool on the John Abbott website. You will need the following photocopied documents:

Choosing your schedule:

Congratulations you have been accepted to John Abbott. Your next step is to choose your gen eds (general education courses) and obtain your schedule for the semester.

Log into your omnivox account, on the left hand navigation bar vou will find a tab called "course registration", click on that. This will bring you to a table showing all the courses you are currently enrolled in. At the top there is a field where to insert the course number that you wish to take. If the course is available it will take you to the schedule selection page, where it shows all the available slots for that class in conjunction with your already registered classes. You can chooses as many classes as can fit on your schedule, but we recommend no more than seven at a time.

Navigating the college:

The John Abbott campus is comprised of seven interconnected buildings with Brittain hall being the only exception. The buildings are:

- Casgrain (C)
- Penfield (P)
- Herzberg (H)
- Hochelaga (HO)

Casgrain is where all the sports related classes are held, since this is where all the gyms and swimming pool is. Here you will also find a Tim Hortons, a popular stop during breaks and the Agora where all sorts of events are held. Hochelaga is home to all humanities courses, as well as info tech and police tech. Most notably, Hochelaga is where business administration classes take place.

Penfield is where all computer related programs are held such as Media Arts and Graphic and Web Design. Penfield's first floor is also where you will find the English department and the student union.

Brittain hall is where all continuing education courses take place. you are in any science related program, your classes will all be here.

Steward apartments, commonly known as rez, is where you will find all the dorms for those who live too far from school to commute back and froth every day.

Steward east is where residence can find all hygiene services, such as dental and the clinic.

Hockey heartbreak versus Dawson



The Isles were facing the longtime rivals Dawson Blues. Dawson opened the score quickly in the first period. The Isles bounced back with 3 goals of their own in the first period (Oona Emmenegger, Andi Calderone and Audrey Gervais) to take the lead 3-1. In the second period a total of 7 goals were scored. Gervais and Emma Beisswanger put the puck in the net for John Abbott.

Starting the third period down by a goal, Gervais completed her hat trick to tie the game. Dawson scored the game winning goal with 16 seconds left in the game, making the final 7-6.

JAC Alumnus takes home HEC Crighton Trophy

For the first time in the history of John Abbott College, an alumnus has taken home the highest honour in Canadian university football. In his third year with the University of Calgary Dinos, quarterback Adam Sinagra (JAC '15) was honoured with the Hec Crighton Trophy as the most outstanding player in U SPORTS football Thursday, at the Vanier Cup gala.

Claire, Québec, proceeded to have one of the best seasons in Canada West football history.

His 3,233 passing yards set a new U SPORTS record, as he led the Dinos to a perfect 8-0 season, and the most potent offence in the nation, averaging 570.9 yards per game. Sinagra ranked second in the nation in passing touchdowns this season with 23, and led the conference with a passer rating of 126. Crighton winner, marking the fifth consecutive season a CW player has taken home Canadian university's biggest individual prize.

John Abbott College Islanders Head Coach Patrick Gregory says of Sinagra: "We are all very proud of Adam's accomplishments. He was a game changer for us, a tremendous competitor who made everyone around him better."

This program provides students with a balanced education that integrates both the basic components of rigorous scientific learning and a general education foundation. Graduates are equipped with a solid



NEW YORK TRIP

Ever wanted to visit the Big Apple? Take a trip to the City that never sleeps? Well here's your chance! For only \$365, you can do just that. You get to spend 3 days and 2 nights at the Edison Hotel, which is just an 8 minute walk from Time Square! Departure is at 6:00am on March 5th from John Abbott. Departure from New York City is at 11:00pm on March 7th.

This package includes all of the following: transportation by deluxe motor-coach, two nights at your hotel, tax and service charges, a four-hour city tour, and services of a representative. No trip to New York is complete without a visit to the 843-acre central park. Designed by Frederick Law Olmsted and Calvert Vaux, the sprawling beauty makes you forget you're in a crowded city. No matter the season, the green space offers plenty for visitors to see, from the Shakespeare Garden, Strawberry Fields, and a tribute to John Lennon. As you stroll through the forest terrain, keep an eye out for the iconic Alice in Wonderland and Balto statues. To go more in-depth during you visit, you can take a free welcome tour of certain areas of the park, including the northern welcome tour, southern welcome tour, and heart of the park tour.

On Friday evenings from 4pm to 8pm, UNIQLO hosts free visits to the Museum of Modern Art. The pass lets visitors view all galleries, exhibits, and films during their trip. Located in Midtown, MoMA features a wide range of permanent and rotating collections, with everything from Monet to Matisse. It's recommended that visitors arrive early at the museum, because as theevening continues, crowds tend to grow.

Enjoy a 25-minute trip from Manhattan to Staten Island via this Staten Island Ferry. The ride offers views of the Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island, and the skyline, as it takes you from Whitehall Street in lower Manhattan to St. George on Staten Island. More than 22 million people travel on the ferry each year, with about 109 trips per day. With five boats on rotating schedules (four on weekends), you can catch the ferry regularly throughout the day.

Pick up an information sheet in Student Activities (H-159) and secure a space by egistering online and paying a \$150 deposit. The final balance is to be settled by January 31, 2018. Make sure to hurry, because only fifty-four spots are guaranteed.

ABOUT JAC

Who was John Abbott ?

Sir John Abbott, Canada's third Prime Minister, was born in 1821 in the quiet village of Saint Andrews East (now Saint-André-d'Argenteuil, an hour north of Montreal), and then went on to become one of Canada's most prominent figures.

The first Canadian-born Prime Minister, Sir John is also noted for a multitude of other accomplishments during his long and illustrious career in law, business and politics. He served as Solicitor General for Lower Canada (Québec), was the Liberal-Conservative member of the House of Commons, was appointed to the House of Parliament's Senate and was Mayor of Montreal — twice. Sir John was widely viewed as one of Canada's most successful lawyers in his time, and for 23 years, he headed the Faculty of Law at McGill University, his alma mater, where Sir Wilfrid Laurier, future Prime Minister of Canada, was among his students.

Sir John was also key in founding several of Canada's great institutions: the Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal; the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts; the Fraser Institute; the Canadian SPCA; and the Canadian Pacific Railway, the country's first transcontinental rail system. Knighted in 1892 for his outstanding contribution to the development of Canadian society, the great statesman died on October 30 the following year at the home he built on the shores of Lake of Two Mountains in Senneville.

Despite a lifetime spent in public office, Sir John shied from the trappings of fame, preferring to focus instead on service. It is this commitment to social responsibility for its own virtue that inspires John Abbott College to honour the legacy of our namesake, staying true above all to leadership, excellence and service. With a focus on community, education and the ongoing development of society, we continue to uphold the principles of one of our nation's greatest leaders, and are dedicated to building on Canada and Québec's shared reputation as a beacon of cultural, intellectual and philanthropic advancement.





Why choose JAC

Since John Abbott College opened in 1971, it has been a significant part of English post-secondary education in Quebec and a pillar in the Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue community. Today, the College caters to over 6500 day students and more than 2000 Continuing Education students from Québec, Canada and abroad. John Abbott College offers a wide range of career and pre-university programs specifically designed to give students the necessary tools to succeed in society. In addition to having a dedicated and knowledgeable teaching staff and quality facilities, the College goes above and beyond by offering outstanding services to its students, and all this from a breathtaking lakeside campus.

History and Background

John Abbott College is one of five English language CEGEPs in Québec. Named after Sir John Abbott, Canada's third Prime Minister, the College primarily serves the Greater Montreal region, though you can also meet students here from other parts of Québec and the rest of Canada. The College also has a significant number of international students as part of its community. In total, over 6,500 students are enrolled in the Day Division and about 2,000 in the Continuing Education Division.

The College was incorporated in 1970, merely two years after the Québec CEGEP system was launched in 1968. In September of 1971, John Abbott welcomed roughly 1200 young men and women as its first students. By 1980, the CEGEP was well established on a permanent campus and had a student base of about 4000 daytime and 2000 evening students. Since then, the College has grown by leaps and bounds, increasing attendance, adding and improving existing programs, and becoming one of the top

rated English CEGEPs in Québec.

Situated on the most western tip of the island of Montreal, in Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue, John Abbott enjoys a rural setting just a half hour drive from downtown Montreal. As one of 48 CEGEPs (collège d'enseignement général et professionnel) in Québec, John Abbott offers two types of programs: two-year preuniversity programs that lead to university, and three-year career or professional programs designed to lead directly to the labour market.

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About the Old JAC Library

John Abbott College Foundation

The library opened in 1907 as part of McGill University, Macdonald campus. Two-hundred and fifteen students studied on-site at the time, paying \$3.25 per week if they chose to live in residence.

In 1911, the Macdonald library boasted "one of the finest college libraries in Canada" with an aesthetically pleasing reading room and space for all interested in studying and reading. Although the collection focused primarily on textbooks and reference books, there was a collection of the 'greatest novelists' and academic materials. Due to a lack of funding for novels that year, the resourceful group decided to start an annual tradition every graduate would donate a book of fiction upon leaving.

By 1962, an expansion was in order having outgrown the space for the increasing number of books and services available to students. Among the most notable changes - the north side of the ground floor saw large windows added letting in much more daylight.

John Abbott College opened its doors in 1971 in Sainte-Annede-Bellevue, sharing the Macdonald library space.

J.C. Spence & Sons Glass Artworks (est. Montreal 1856) manufactured the painted glass windows on the ground and second floors of the library. It is not known what year the windows were installed, but correspondence between the manufacturer and Macdonald College architects, Hutchison, Wood and Miller, took place from 1907 to 1908.

The main floor windows feature the coats of arms of Canadian provinces as well as the emblems of several universities including McGill and Laval. It is unknown why this particular theme was chosen for the panes. The preservation of these windows is an important phase of the current library project as they are a vital part of the building heritage.

The columns present throughout the main floor today are original from 1907. The decorative capitals at the top of the columns and crests were originally gold, with coloured details. During the renovation that took place in the 1980s, the columns and crests were whitewashed to look more neutral. The second floor crests and relief along the walls and windows were retouched in their original colours. These artistic details are also being carefully preserved.

2017-2018 Renovation Plan

During the fall of 2017, the most significant library renovations began in earnest. Priorities of this major project include the following:

 Providing inspirational study and learning spaces for both quiet individual study and rooms for group work.

-Increasing seating capacity and access to electrical outlets, (the goal is to create 60% more places to sit, and increase electrical outlets by 40%-allowing students to charge their devices).

-Designing teaching and flexible collaborative spaces thereby improving the student experience. An Information Literacy Lab will be added to help librarians teach students how to navigate library resources when doing research.

-Upgrading library infrastructure and ventilation systems: better airflow and lighting is a must as conditions in the summer are hot and humid, which is uncomfortable for users and can damage the book collection. Improved lighting will ensure an optimal studying/reading environment.

-Enhancing technological infrastructure, giving access to relevant, current technology.

-Consolidating operational units within the library such as a tutoring hub, with the following services working together: Peer Tutoring Centre, English Writing Centre and Centre d'aide en français. To have all three in close proximity will allow students direct access to either language or subject specific tutoring.

Why not get recognized for the difference you make!

You must meet 4 compulsory criteria to obtain your SIR mention;

* Be involved with your activity for a minimum of 60 hours per semester. In some cases, it may be extended to two semesters.

* Be a full-time student during the period of involvement. * Be academically successful during the semester when the activity takes place.

* You must not obtain any form of compensation for your involvement and the activity must be strictly on a volunteer basis.

Students can meet with a nurse to talk about health concerns or health choices they are making. Often this includes general health, nutrition, birth control, pregnancy testing and counselling, sexually transmitted infections, emotional wellbeing and stress.

Our on-campus medical clinic is open two-half days a week. Students can make an appointment to see a doctor for a variety of health services such as, general checkups, health problems, mental health, contraception, pregnancy testing, sexually transmitted infections testing and treatment. Arrangements can also be made for students requiring allergy shots.
