




Welcome to XPLOREmtl, the magazine by Montrealers, for Montrealers!

Do you find that there are enough vegan options out in the Montreal restaurant business?




Montreal Mural Festival

For the seventh time the walls of the Plateau in downtown Montreal will be transformed into an urban artists playground. People from all over the world will gather to celebrate the international urban art movement. The Montreal Mural Festival is a free elven day event with so much going on. The urban art movement brings together street artist and graffiti artists. A phenomenon that stated in Philadelphia in the late 60's graffiti was looked down on as vandalism. As the years went on people moved away from lettering and tagging and moved more towards murals and wall paintings, using city walls as their canvas. People began to appreciate this form of art and see the beauty in it. This gave festivals such as Montreal's Mural Festival the chance to grow. Now in its seventh year Montreal's Mural Festival hosts plenty of different events such as live music, artist talk, the chance to watch the artist's work and so much more. This year's artist lineup includes names from all over the world. You can see Ben Johnson, Germ Dee, Gleo, Hyuro and many more at work. The full lineup can be found on Mural Festivals website along with an interactive map of the city and where the paintings are taking place. //200words// The festival also promotes artist talks where you can learn a bit about the artists. They'll bring you through their creative process, give you a look into their offices or home studios and then most of the time finish with a live q&a so any questions you may have for them don't go unanswered. Street art is the biggest part of the festival but there are plenty of other things to do over this ten-day period. The festival also hosts live music shows. 15 minutes With Alex Wheeler


In this article we caught up with Alex Wheeler, a young graphic designer from Montreal, Quebec who, on the side, works on street art, lettering and graffiti. We had the chance to sit down and talk to him about street art, the urban art movement and his hopes for his work in that domain.

Can you tell us a little about yourself?

I am a 23 year old graphic designer from Rigaud, Quebec. I dabbled with graphic design in high school and then went into the Graphic design program at John Abbott College. When i started the program it was called (PDHT). Graphic design has always been a passion for me but I've always been very into street art and graffiti. I am currently working for (COMNAY NAME). I do a lot of posters and ads for various companies. If ever you are in the downtown Montreal area you might spot a billboard poster i did for La Belle et La Boeuf. Another good place to spot my work is Beta Bloque where i design most of their pamphlets, posters and promotional ads.

How did you get into graffiti/street art?

I was never a very good at what you would call conventional drawing. I couldn't draw very realistic images. But i loved to draw. So i started doodling. Soon my doodles all followed a certain style that is now very apparent in my work that you see today. Very grungy almost alien creatures make up a lot of my pieces. For the graffiti aspect i was always interested in graffiti. I got into on the wrong foot however. When i was younger i decided to go out and tag a building near my house. I got caught by a cop just on a patrol. This run in turned me off to the actual spray painting graffiti on walls so i turned to pen and paper. After that whenever i went downtown i would take photos of the pieces or tags that i say and when i got home i would try to recreate them in my sketchbook. Started selling my work and thats when i started to get noticed. I was paid to paint on a few smaller walls around my near my hometown but nothing major yet.



What accomplishments to you wish to achieve?

A huge one would be to be invited to something like the Montreal Mural Festival or Pow! Wow! Street Festival. To have my work showcased at an event like that, in a city like this? Montreal has a huge emphasis on the arts and street art keeps growing in popularity and in recognition. On a smaller scale i would love to be commissioned to paint a mural downtown Montreal, anywhere. I think it would be awesome to be walking downtown one day with my kids and say "Hey guys you see that? I painted that one". Just to add to the canvas that is the city of Montreal would be a dream come true.

Who are some of your biggest influences?

Growing up i read a lot of street art magazines, SAM (street and more) and street art news to name a few. When trying to improve my photography someone once told me the most important thing to buy is a magazine subscription and i believe this to be true with graffiti as well. Just going through those magazines influenced my own work so much. In terms of artists Banksy was a huge influence. I loved how he took known pieces or political issues and turned them into something that really made you think. The majority of his pieces are up to personal interpretation. My favourite piece by him is "Keep your coins, I want change". I love how he uses the double meaning of change.

What would you say is the most important thing for a budding artist?

Draw. Every. Day. Honestly i can't state this enough. Set aside 15 mins every day and just draw what you feel. Don't try to plan it out just practice. For graffiti take one word and draw it in a bunch of different styles. We re so scared to fail or to make something that we don't like that we block. This stops us from getting anywhere in our domains. Also never throw anything away. There have been numerous times where i just flipped through an old sketchbook and found inspiration. I would remake old pieces of mine and some of them have been my most sold pieces. Just trust your abilities and let yourself be creative. At the end of the day you are creating things that you should like.


Kalmunity is known to be Canada's largest and longest running black arts and improv collective with over 60 creatives being members since its founding in 2003 by Jahsun. He has described the creation of Kalmunity as "an opportunity to create a space where we could come back to the essence of why we play music — to express the inexplicable, to express the soul. The best way to do that is to be as honest as possible, and the best way to do that is through the improvisation element." The Montreal Gazette named Kalmunity to be 1 of 5 best places to take out of towners as they produce 2 weekly events of improvised music; Jazz Sunday evenings at Café Resonance and Hip Hop Tuesday nights at Petit Campus. Kalmunity was created to be "an outlet for black and cultural expression", and has had a large part in the protection and development of Montreal black music in addition to being a part of workshops for young artists and outreach programs.





Having been already featured at events like The Montreal Jazz Fest, House of Paint, Nuits D'Afrique, and many of the like, Kalmunity is putting together the second edition of a festival to continue their work of offering a space for black artists, and opportunities for locals and visitors to see part of Montreal culture. In addition to music, the Kalmunity Music Week will also highlight the KVC Urban Market, the Black Speculative Art Movement: Afrofuturism Conference, Youth and Community outreach, panels, discussions, workshops, and much, much more. With the likes of Dwayne Morgan, Chanda and the Passengers, DJ Lady Oracle, and Jason 'Blackbird' Selman, you can either choose to go for one day for as little as \$10, or go for the whole week for only \$150.

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Checking out Montreal's Music Scene: O Cara

Montreal is known to be a city of artistic expression, from film to art to even a vibrant independent music scene that has been around since the 1990s. This April's edition of "Band of the Month" is a part of the latter scene, Montreal-bred O Cara. You might have seen them at local shows like the annual fundraiser, Coldest Night of the Year, or playing a gig at the likes of St-Laurent's Barfly. They released their first EP, CLARITIES or whatever, just last year in August on Bandcamp. This month, our reporter was able to sit down with one of the guitarists of O Cara, Timothy Bryan, and give a glance of what O Cara is about, and what it is like to be a part of a thriving music scene in Montreal.

X: What are your goals for the band, to just have fun for now or produce music to make money?

X: Thank you for taking the time to do this Timothy, I'm sure our readers will be very interested to hear about your band and your perspective on being an independent band in Montreal. Why don't we start with you telling me a bit about O Cara: your musical style, your band members, a brief history of who you are?

TB: "Me and some friends started O Cara a few years ago, in 2017 I think. At the time it was myself on guitar, Ryan on guitar, Ben on keys, Pat on bass, and Josiah on drums. Everyone but Josiah took turns on vocals. Ben ended up playing with us for about 6 months, but ended up leaving due to he didn't really want to play in a band. Pat was with us for about a year, but left a little while after he moved to Ottawa. He was replaced by Julien, and that has been the line-up for the last year and a bit.

Stylistically, we've always been all over the place. We originally started with heavy influences of Canadian folk music, jazz, spoken word, and math rock. The first year or so we actually played almost only acoustic music. With the evolution of time and members, we're a bit heavier now and have a stronger influence of indie, alternative, and post-hardcore. A few of our biggest influences are MewithoutYou, Radiohead, and Manchester Orchestra."

TB: "Best case scenario would be to have a career from playing music, but with the current state of the music scene and especially with the kind of music we play (ie. not particularly marketable) that's not a feasible option unless we a) went full-time with touring/writing/recording year-round and b) got lucky. None of us are all that interested in giving up everything else going on in our lives to pursue this with that level of commitment, so for now we're just enjoying writing with each other, playing shows, and releasing music when we can. We want it to be a part of our lives, but there's no expectation that it will be financially viable for us."

X: How was it to make an EP, interested in a full CD or happy for now?

TB: "The EP was really fun to make, and it was a great learning experience for all of us. We definitely want to keep making and releasing music, and we'll hopefully have more music out before the end of the year. We're not sure what kind of release it will be, but a full album definitely isn't out of the question."

X: What is it like to be a part of the music scene in Montreal; what are your favorite things about it and what is frustrating?

TB: "It's pretty great to be honest, compared to a lot of other cities. We have such a vibrant city and there's always so much going on, and the scene is diverse enough to support so many artists in tons of different styles. My only frustration with the scene is that myself and Julien, the two members of the band that regularly go to shows and participate in the scene, are actually mainly involved in hardcore and metal, so it has been challenging finding shows and promoters in the indie crowd. The scene defi-




nitely exists, but we're not that well-connected right now. We do have a few good contacts that have gotten us shows, and we're hoping that as we remain active and play more and release music we'll become more integrated and people will know who we are."

X: As an ending note, what are your favorite local bands and festivals that you suggest for our readers?

TB: "Osheaga is a plague. Some local bands I like are Kennedy, Offset, Patent, Chthe'ilist, Gulfer, Fer Sher, Bas Relief, Lil' Andy, and Bule."

So there you have it readers, another independent band coming out of Montreal's music scene, here to give you fresh music hopefully this year. It is not easy to try to make it in such a large city full of artistic potential, but you may want to keep an eye out for this one, and the other bands Timothy had mentioned. We can easily get swept-up in the popular music from the United States, but I'm here to remind you that we have plenty of amazing artists in our own backyard. Check this section out next month to hear about another Montreal band, to get more music suggestions, and maybe hear more about festivals beyond "Osheaga is a plague". Remember to check out O Cara on Facebook, Instagram, and Bandcamp for their EP and upcoming events they will be playing at, and always support your local artists of every kind.

Me: Do you plan on expanding the business by having


Me: Do you plan on expanding the business by having other storefronts elsewhere?

Ladies, Gents, and whomever, welcome to the world of "underground" bars; the kind of night out you have to actively search for.

Secret bars, or speakeasies, date from the prohibition period in the United States. There was a time, believe it or not, when alcohol consumption was illegal, even for adults! Desperate times called for desperate measures and bars hidden behind shops, laundromats, and anything commercial and legal began popping up all over North America. Thankfully, today, we can drink, but the concept is still cool and exciting, and there is something special about walking around and anticipating an ambiance with no clue of what to expect.

Montreal sure got the hint, and now our city crawls with fascinating holes in the wall, behind the alley, through the tunnel, to the right, here you are, have a drink! We've checked out a few spots, such as Henden, a speakeasy located behind the scrumptious "Bird Bar" on Notre-Dame street downtown, and the Atwater Cocktail Club, located somewhere behind Foiegwa, another delightful eatery. In the old port you can find Velvet, a hotel that happens to conceal a pretty fantastic hub to enjoy house music, and finally, our favourite so far, a new speakeasy club called Sous-Bois, that is just as mystical as the name makes it sound. Located beneath a restaurant of the same name, a stroll down the staircase leads you to their "enchanted forest", a beautifully decorated dance club with an inviting and colourful atmosphere. We made it our mission to pay them a visit and ask the owner, Alexandre Brosseau, a few questions of our own, in case our pitch doesn't already have you strapping on your heels, zipping up your dresses and buttoning your suits.

Hi, nice to meet you Alex, can we call you Alex?

A.B: "*laughs* Sure."

Great! So, Alex, what was your inspiration for the decor of this restaurant?

A.B: "The concept of Sous Bois was to create an underground forest where people could live out the experience of a "Souper Champêtre", a classy traditional dinner from the Quebec region, in the heart of Montreal's city. It's sort of a play on Quebec's roots,

You said it got people talking about you. That was sort of one of our questions. Would you say the concept of a "secret bar" makes up for the fact that it's hidden? How do you advertise?

A.B: "Well I mean we do have a restaurant, and our restaurant is visible on the street. We also have a website and an instagram, and we advertise about as much as any other restaurant or bar would. You have to remember that alcohol is thankfully legal these days, and therefore we don't actually need to hide the existence of our bar from the internet. It's only invisible to those who haven't heard of it or have only heard of the restaurant, which makes it an even more exciting discovery for them. That's definitely fun, and we've often had tourists come in and express their awe at the speakeasy, because they were completely clueless when their friends dragged them in. That's probably one of the most enjoyable things to witness as the owner. But in the end the speakeasy is more of a creative choice, to have something attractive and different."

Could you describe the experience for someone who may have never been here?

A.B: "Well, we're located near Peel street, which is a very busy area in downtown Montreal, and it is always buzzing with people. Upon entry, the restaurant itself holds a cozy and warm ambience, but if you're more interested in mystery and excitement, you can step through the door of our "cabin in the woods", where the first thing you will see is a window with a view on the lake, closely followed by the staircase leading to the underground. As you make your way down, it becomes extensively clear that you are now in a cabin. Once you reach the lower level, at the end of the artwork-covered hallway awaits the common room, which is a lounging spot equipped with sofas and a coffee table. Next to the lounge is a bookshelf, except it's no ordinary shelf, as behind it you will discover a whole other room, with it's own set of bartenders and countless drinks to choose from."

Not gonna lie, that's pretty impressive, but we have to ask, why all this and not just a bar?

A.B: "*Chuckles* Why not? It's unusual, its mysterious and it definitely gets people talking about us. It's also great for photos and it's the perfect Montreal novelty to show your tourist friends."





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
