



Dan Gerhard Brown was born on June 22, 1964, in Exeter, New Hampshire. He is a thriller author. He has a younger sister, Valerie (born 1968) and brother, Gregory (born 1974). Brown attended Exeter's public schools until the ninth grade. He grew up on the campus of Phillips Exeter Academy, where his father, Richard G. Brown, was a teacher of mathematics and wrote textbooks. from 1968 until his retirement in 1997. His mother, Constance, trained as a church organist and student of sacred music.
