



ANASTASIA

Montreal is renowned for its music festivals. The city is constantly hosting music festivals throughout the year. Osheaga, Mural, Ile Soniq, the International Jazz Fest, Piknic Électronik and Igloofest, just to name a few...

Osheaga is probably the biggest of the Montreal music festivals. It features a whole set of genres, artists It takes place in Summer in parc Jean-Drapeau on Île Ste-Hélène (Where Laronde is!) and takes place over a few days.

I was able to get into contact with a Osheaga 2018 attendee and she gladly accepted to let me interview her.

So, when did you go to Osheaga? (day(s), year, what time, etc.)

"I went to Osheaga last year in August. I do not remember the exact day but I'm pretty sure I went on the Sunday the 5th. I got there around 2pm. It was pretty fun. I met up with my friend earlier that day to get prepared and we took the metro to get there."

How did you find it? (did you go with friends? how was the music, environment, weather, was it worth it? was it tiring?)

"Since one of my best friends was going. She had an extra ticket and offered the opportunity to go, I was able to go for free! I had a lot of fun, but it was really crowded. There were some songs that I didn't know but I still think the music was good because I knew most of the songs of the singers that I saw perform. The weather was great, even though it was extremely hot. The company organizing Osheaga made sure that there would be a jet of water that would spray onto the crowd every ten minutes or so. I really think it was an amazing experience, everyone there were cool, and all loved the same music as me! Obviously, it was worth it for me because I went for free, but I still think it would be worth it if I had paid. It was tiring though, and I could barely stand up by the end of it."

Which artists did you go see? (who were your favorites?)

"Unfortunately, I was unable to see everyone that was presenting on that day but I went to go see Florence and the Machine, BROCKHAMPTON, Franz Ferdinand, Cuco, The Neighbourhood, Post Malone, Dua Lipa and LAUV. But Post Malone was my favorite. He was so cool, and I love his songs, so it was very cool being able to see him in person." What was the best thing about going to this music festival?

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"Seeing a bunch of artists live! I loved the lineup and it was really amazing being able to see all these artists perform back to back in one spot. I really appreciate it that there isn't one specific genre of music, it makes things more interesting and more diverse."

Have you been to other music festivals? How do they compare to Osheaga?

"Osheaga is really fun because there isn't one type of music, festivals like lle Sonic and Picnik are mostly just electronic music, which is cool but Osheaga really stands out because of its diversity. As for other music festivals I've attended, I haven't gone to many, but I once went to this rave; I forget what it is called but it was basically a free lle Sonic, but it was also very fun, still very tiring, but fun!"

Do you want to go again this year? If no, why not?

"I do want to go again either to Osheaga or Ile Sonic. I really want to see either Bad Bunny or J Balvin but I would only go for one day only because it gets very tiring and it is very expensive. I was fortunate enough that I went for free!"

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This year's Osheaga's lineup was released at the end of March. The 2019 lineup features artists such as the famed Childish Gambino, Flume, Interpol, The Franklin Electric, boy pablo, laye and many, many more. The festival will be taking place from Friday, August 2nd to Sunday, August 4th and tickets start from 125\$ CAD for a single day or up to 1250\$ CAD for VIP access and a bunch more exclusive perks. Each day will feature different artists every one of those days, so make sure to plan accordingly!

THE OFFICIAL OSHEAGA LINE-UP



Osheaga is one of the biggest events in Montreal during the Summer and, honestly, it can get a bit overwhelming. Especially, if it's your first time going. So we thought of a few tips and tricks for you to get by Osheaga without any trouble!

- 1. Be prepared for any kind of weather. You never know how the temperature is going to end up being during the weekend, so make sure to bring an extra sweater, a rain jacket and/or an umbrella just in case!
- 2. Plan out your weekend! 3 days, 7 stages and an enormous number of artists! It is crucial for Osheaga attendees to plan out their day(s) and decide what their priorities are. You do not, I repeat, DO NOT, want to miss your favorite song by your favorite artist just because you thought you had time to go grab a coffee beforehand.
- 3. Dress comfortably. Osheaga will be tiring, that is a fact. You will be standing and jumping for hours in the heat and/or the rain, so it is necessary to dress appropriately. Also, keep in mind the paths are made of gravel, so it is probably best that you wear comfortable sneakers. We do not recommend you wear skin tight leather pants or stilettos during the festival.
- 4. Bring cash! There are a lot of food stands and snack bars all around the site. But a lot of them only accept cash. There are ATMs around the grounds but there is often a line to use them, so don't forget to take out some cash before going into the festival.
- 5. Stay hydrated. This one should be obvious but BRING A WATER BOTTLE! There are water fountains scattered around the site but it is a very good idea to bring a bottle so you can refill it every now and then. The last thing you want to do while you're having fun listening to music is passing out due to dehydration.

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The Old Port

There are many street performances that you can enjoy at Place Jacques Cartier. If you like shopping you are in luck, because there are many souvenir and stores around the area. 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The Botanical Garden

Located in the Metropolis Downtown Core, is home to more that 22,000 species of flora. This activity includes a very low cost for children being 8 dollars and 15 dollars for adults. Take a stroll around the Chinese Garden which showcases designs from the 14th and 17th century. All outdoor gardens include a colorful alpine and rose garden. There is a lot to see, especially if you are visiting with kids, you won't want to miss out on one of the largest insect museums in North America with more than 250,000 of living organisms. It is easy and accessible to visit being located in northern Plateau Mont-Royal in Parc Maisonneuve.

-RAQUEL

What is your favorite season to visit Montreal?

Out of all the seasons, my favorite stay was definitely the fall. The fall is my favorite season because the leaf's and trees look very gorgeous when they are different colors. It was beyond my expectation, because Downtown had very new buildings compared to the old Montreal that has older buildings that are very well kept.



SEARCHING FOR THE RIGHT CLUB ON YOUR VACATION IN MONTREAL?

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Come enjoy the nightlife, in the heart of Montreal. The downtown area has many late night activities to visit. If you love the thrill of house and techno music, then Stereo Nightclub on Saint Catherine Street is the place for you. Stereo's dance floor areoutfitted with springs and shock absorbers for party animals to let loose. Le Rouge Bar is another amazing club that has been voted as one of Montreal's best nightclubs for over a decade. With two floors, Rouge serves up the city's hottest DJs in a relaxed atmosphere on Friday and Saturday nights. Located at Prince Arthur and Saint-Laurent, this club is always a good bet for a lively night out.

If either of these clubs aren't your cup of tea, you can always rely on New City Gas. Located on Ottawa St, near the Bonaventure metro station. New City Gas is housed in a complex that was originally built in 1859 for the purpose of transforming coal into gas for lighting the streets and buildings of Montreal. Today, the heritage building has been repurposed into a multi-purpose event and entertainment space that covers 40,000 square feet and two floors. New City Gas hosts a range of large events, including private functions to New Year's Eve parties. Every week, over 3,000 people head over to New City Gas to party to the tunes of internationally renowned DJs and artists. After enjoying great music, why not head over to any of our fantastic pubs to enjoy a delicious poutine and a glass of beer . Hurley's Irish Pub on Rue Crescent, is a great place to visit. Established in 1993, Hurley's lies in the heart of Montreal. Offering live traditional music every night, 19 beers on tap, a selection of more than 50 single malts and 16 whiskeys and hearty fare. Hurley's laid-back atmosphere is a long-time favorite with locals and a destination for newcomers.

No matter what time of the year you visit Montreal, our nightlife will always be amazing. When it comes to partying Montreal is considered "trend-setting". Our city is vibrant and full of excitement, we attract attention from touring bands and DJs all around the world to come to our nightclubs. From underground dance clubs to comedy shows, there's something for everyone. With the large variety of clubs and bars in the downtown area, tourists and locals have plenty of options to choose from. To help filter the clubs, we interviewed party specialist and club promoter Jonathan Vocelle to get the inside scoop on what tourists should look for when searching for the right club on their vacation in Montreal.



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INTERVIEW WITH JONATHAN VOCELLE

MTL: Can you tell me about what you do?

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Jonathan Vocelle: I'm a promoter for an array of clubs downtown, and I run a page that can get you in many more. Being a promoter isn't really a job, it's more of a side hustle. You can do it in many ways. Usually, you start out by being very present at the club. Either you always bring a crowd every week, or you do street promoting which consists of selling your guest list to passersby. That being said, you can always work from home and do online promoting. The most paying thing for promoters and clubs alike are birthdays since people tend to get tables. It's a fun thing to do if you know a lot of people and know how to move a crowd!

MTL: How would you describe the clubbing scene here in Montreal?

JV: You'll have a few niche clubs and then most of them are very mixed. In that sense, you can pick almost any club and your experience would be similar. I think the most important is to go with a large group of friends and be ready to move because you never really know how well you'll vibe with the people there that night.

MTL: From your experience, how do you choose the right club to go to?

JV: I just know. People like to test this, and I always end up being right. I know when something particular is happening downtown, and that's when you want to go. Like I said, most clubs offer mostly the same bland experience, so when there's something hot happening you want to jump on it.

MTL: Before you go, one last question I'd like to ask you; what are the clubs you'd list as 'must see' in the downtown area?

JV: There are many, and they might not all apply to you

. École is definitively the Supreme of clubs. Expensive, in demand, and mostly for young people. Then, Rouge is pretty popular. I always say you can't go wrong with Rouge. It's my go-to when nothing else works. On St-Laurent, people also like Muzique, Apt. 200 and Tokyo although I wouldn't recommend the latter two. If you're French, La Petite Grenouille is your club. Somwhr is one of my personal favourites, the vibe is just right. It's situated in the Old Port, meaning it's mainly for people aged 25-30. Bord'elle and La Voûte are pretty popular Old Port clubs also. I work at Le Cinq and it's nice on Halloween, but that's about it. Another club that's worth mentioning is Circus After-hours. Definitively the most underrated club of all time. It's the biggest club downtown in terms of size, and as the name says, it's an after hour club - meaning you can't go wrong.

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THE BEST AREAS TO STAY FOR NIGHTLIFE IN MONTREAL

Downtown Montreal: Being centrally located is always a good idea when it comes to exploring the nightlife scene in Montreal, because the downtown area offers easy access to many of the districts listed below—in addition to the lively array of restaurants, bars, and clubs (both dance and strip varieties) that can be found along the main stretch of Rue St. Catherine. Downtown, you'll also be able to see most of the city's seemingly countless festivals. If you want to be right at the heart of the action, downtown Montreal should definitely be your top choice.

Rue Crescent: If you're downtown, it's hard to miss Rue Crescent. It's alive with young people looking to have a good time among the many clubs and bars that line the street. This stretch is most suitable for revelers in their early 20s, especially undergraduate students or those who have ventured to the city in order to take advantage of Quebec's 18+ drinking age—among the lowest legal drinking ages in North America.

Old Montreal: Old Montreal is the city's historic district, which also puts it among the most popular tourist destinations. Among the cobblestone streets and historic architecture—with some structures dating as far back as the 17th century—you'll find a number of bars, elegant lounges, and upscale dining options. Some of the finest hotels in the city can also be found in Old Montreal, so it's a perfect place to stay if you want to have easy access to the downtown core while also enjoying a touch of sophistication.


The Plateau: The Plateau is another popular neighborhood to stay in during your visit to Montreal. It doesn't feature a wide variety of hotels, but you'll certainly find numerous hostel and Airbnb listings for this area. Bars, including sophisticated wine bars, pubs, and clubs, lie along major streets like Avenue Mont-Royal, Boulevard St. Laurent, and Rue St. Denis—which are conveniently within a few minutes' walking distance from one another.

Boulevard St. Laurent: Along with Rue Crescent, Boulevard St. Laurent is one of the main arteries for nightlife in Montreal. Many would vouch that it's the preferred stretch for clubs, especially those catering more to young professionals rather than undergraduate students and tourists. Aim for Airbnbs that are as close as possible to this vibrant boulevard in order to catch all the fun. Stick to the area that runs from around Rue Ontario up to Avenue Mont-Royal for the widest range of clubs, restaurants, and more.

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Montreal is known for its incredibly diverse art scene. Being a central hub for all different kinds of cultures around the world it has so many different art styles and themes clashing to create wonderful masterpieces. Montreal has been forever known by tourists and Montrealers alike that the art is extremely memorable and part of the beating heart of the city.

At Montreal fun time we did tons of research on the absolute best galleries and museums. The places where all the artists join together to see the most wonderful works of art. These works of art are hosted in Montreal's many different museums and galleries and we decided to take a look at some of the best ones to make exploring around town that extra bit more fun. The first gallery to take a look at is one that is all the rage with artists in the city. What was once an old cookie factory has been converted into a museum for modern art and the industrial atmosphere of just the place alone is out of this world. Parisian Laundry is located at 3550, Saint-Antoine West and has been around for close to 15 years now and is definitely worth taking a peek at.

If you ever need that amazing pop art and urban art setting, Station 16 has your back. Being hosted in "De Bellefeuile Gallery" in Westmount, Station 16 aims to impress everyone with its bright and vibrant colours emanating from the artwork. Station 16 is known for showcasing art by immigrants and minorities, so it's got a lot of variety and style.

One of the most interesting and positive galleries in downtown Montreal is "La Guilde". A non-profit historical gallery that features First Nations art, specifically Metis and Inuit artworks. Preserving history is extremely important, especially for those whose history is being white washed like the First Nations. It is the only major gallery in Montreal promoting First Nations art heavily so it's definitely worth a visit.

In Montreal's famous Golden Mile lies the "Gallerie de l'île" which houses some of the most famous artwork from all around the world. Dating all the way back to 1934, the gallery is sure to please anyone who is in to art history or just learning about the city in general. Now to move on to big art museums next up we have the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts. This museum is the most well known in town. It boasts thousands of artworks as well as very amazing events that happen every couple of months. The biggest tourist attraction is the art tours that happen where every season there is a new special show of something.

The Contemporary Art Museum is another great museum that rivals the Museum of Fine Arts. Its permanent collection boasts a 7500 works of art being displayed. And on rotating visits has films

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being played as well as performances and plays. These events rotate every season so there's always one showing depending on when you come and visit!

Our final big museum on the list is "Chateau Dufresne". It was created in the early 1900s and is a massive private mansion that hosts art from Montreal's history. It is currently one of the oldest museums in Canada and hosts works by famous Canadian artists as well as many historical works. The place itself is stunning being a big mansion with a beautiful garden in the front. We highly recommend this one as a place to visit as it will take your breath away.Now to move on to the underground art scene, Montreal has a massive number of underground galleries to brag about. These are places that don't get a lot of visitors because they aren't well known but we believe they should be visited because of how wonderful they are.

First up is Articule located in the Mile End. Articule focuses on the interdisciplinary art and encourages a social aspect twist to it. It gives a great opportunity for up and coming artists to host their stuff as they are very open to new people. Next is a great little place called "Optica" on avenue Gaspé. The building itself has been around for at least 50 years now and hosts unique exploratory and experimental artworks. Also, right near "Optica" is "Eastern Bloc" which is a massive warehouse that hosts tons of interdisciplinary art work.

In Old Port we have something very unique, an art café. "Café des Arts" serves excellent coffee with great dishes and is a gallery on top of everything. It is a perfect hangout spot for anyone interested in both the café atmosphere and galleries. Many costomers have stated it has been the best café they have ever been to, with that kind of praise who wouldn't want to visit there? Another great underground art café is located in the mile end called "Arts Café". This Coffee house hosts very special events all year round and has décor to die for, we at Montreal Fun Time absolutely love it.

We hope we have now given you a lot of options to look for great art locations around the city. Doing research for this article we have found so many wonderful places to visit that we haven't even heard of before, visiting every one of them was an incredible treat. What's even more amazing is we haven't even scratched the surface of all of Montreal's wonderful local art scene. Matthew: Hi Ross its so great to talk with you!

Ross: Yes, it's wonderful! I'm so glad to finally chat.

Matthew: What kind of art do you do currently?

Ross: I mostly do poetry I really like playing around with words and how things sound.

M: Do you have a favorite poet? R: My current favorite poet is John Ashbury

M: When did you start working seriously as a poet?

R: In 2015 when I first started working at Dawson College. But I really got interested in highschool about poetry in my English classes there.

M: You've been hosted in a couple poetry pieces published in magazines how do you feel about that?

R: Its exciting that people see my work as interesting and it's a great feeling for readers to connect with my works.

M: What's your favorite poem that you have written?

R: I don't know if I have one necessarily, but I really like my poem called Bob the Builder. I had a lot of fun writing it and I find it funny.

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M: What would you say is a constant theme in your works? R: I really like making poems about writing poems and creating weird poems that don't quite add up as an overall story. I really focus more on wordplay and an example of this would be writing things like "Allegro Al Dente" and creating absurd wordplay such as that.
